Class 5: What We Believe – The Creed (Sunday 10/6)

Creed.

Rite of Acceptance (Sunday 12/1)
Description: In the Rite of Acceptance, candidates and catechumens are invited to attend the 8AM Mass where they are introduced to the parish. The Rite of Acceptance is an ancient rite that dates to the earliest days of the church, and one that is still faithfully practiced in the Catholic church. After Mass, there will be no formal class. There will be a short reception in Holtman Hall.

Class 12: The Blessed Virgin Mary (Sunday 12/8)

Description: The Blessed Virgin Mary is held in high esteem in the Catholic faith. After all, she is the mother of God (being the literal mother of Jesus Christ). As such, she exemplifies what each of us are called to be - members of the Holy Family of God.

Class 13: The Church (Sunday 12/15)

Description: Jesus Christ established the church to be the visible extension of his presence and authority on earth. What does the Bible say about the church? What does Catholic theology teach about it? In this class we will also delve into the Four Marks of the Church. Resources: CCC 748-962.

Class 25: Becoming Catholic (Sunday 4/6)

Instructor: Rodney Kadura

Description: In this class we review and reflect upon all that we have learned. We will also discuss the Sacrament of Reconciliation reception which is required of all candidates prior to reception of the three Sacraments of Initiation at the Easter Vigil.

Sacrament of Reconciliation (Anytime in the 2 weeks prior to the Easter Vigil) Candidates must attend the Sacrament of Reconciliation prior to the Easter Vigil. See Appendix for more information.

Class 26: Easter Vigil Walkthrough (Sunday 4/13)
Description: This is the last meeting, before the Easter Vigil, when prospective candidates and catechumens will be welcomed into full communion with the Catholic Church. In this class we will do a walkthrough for the Easter Vigil.

Easter Vigil (Saturday 4/19)
Description: On the Easter Vigil, held on Holy Saturday, candidates and catechumens wishing to enter into full communion with the Catholic Church receive the three Sacraments of Initiation: Baptism, Confirmation, and First Communion.

Class 27: Mystagogy (Sunday 4/27)

Instructor: Karen Tucker
Description: Mystagogy – or the "revealing of the mysteries" – is the last official act of the OCIA process. In ancient times, Mystagogy defined the final revelation of the Sacraments and their meaning. Today, Mystagogy is used to introduce new Catholics to the Catholic way of life.

Rite of Acceptance (Sunday 12/1)

Candidates and catechumens are invited to attend the 8AM Mass where they are introduced to the parish. The Rite of Acceptance is an ancient rite that dates to the earliest days of the church, and one that is still faithfully practiced in the Catholic church. After Mass, there will be no formal class.

The Rite isn't about candidates and catechumens accepting the Church. That comes later, as something called the Rite of Election. Rather, the Rite of Acceptance is about the Church accepting our new candidates and catechumens.

There is not class following the 8AM Mass. Instead, there will be a short reception in Holtman Hall.

Rite of Election (Saturday 3/8)

The Rite of Election is another ancient rite of the Catholic Church. Catechumens are invited to attend the Diocesan Rite of Election ceremony (location TBD).

Candidates (i.e. those you have already been baptized) need not attend this event. However, candidates are still invited to attend and lend support to our catechumens, who, from this point forward, will be known as the Elect.

The Scrutinies (Sunday 3/23, Sunday 3/30, Sunday 4/6)

The Scrutinies are associated with three specific Gospel stories on the third, fourth, and fifth Sundays of Lent:

- Jesus encountering the Samaritan woman at the well, where He offers Himself as the Living Water,
- Jesus healing the man born blind, where He gives Himself as Light of the World, and Jesus raising Lazarus from the dead, where He reveals Himself as the Resurrection and the Life.

After the Gospel and Homily, the Elect and their Sponsors come forward during each of the three weeks of the Scrutinies. The Celebrant addresses the whole assembly, asking us to pray for a spirit of repentance, an awareness of sin, and strength of will for the Elect. He prays for them as we pray for them. While this is happening, we can recognize the need to seek these same graces in prayer for our own continuous conversions.

Sacrament of Reconciliation (Anytime in the 2 weeks prior to the Easter Vigil)

Prior to the Easter Vigil, all candidates are required to attend the Sacrament of Reconciliation (a.k.a. Confession). Candidates can do this at any point in the two weeks leading up to the Easter Vigil. Typically, our church has a Penitential Rite in which priests from all over the Diocese come to hear confessions at our parish.

Easter Vigil (Saturday 4/19)

On the Easter Vigil, held on Holy Saturday before Easter Sunda, candidates and catechumens wishing to enter into full communion with the Catholic Church receive the three Sacraments of Initiation: Baptism, Confirmation, and First Communion.
