Rite of Acceptance (Sunday 11/27)

Description: In the Rite of Acceptance, candidates and catechumens are invited to attend the 8AM Mass where they are introduced to the parish. The Rite of Acceptance is an ancient rite that dates to the earliest days of the church, and one that is still faithfully practiced in the Catholic church. After Mass, there will be no formal class. If the situation permits, there will be a short reception in Holtman Hall.

Class 25: Becoming Catholic (Sunday 4/2) Instructor: Rodney Kadura

Description: This is the last class, before the Easter Vigil, when prospective candidates and catechumens will be welcomed into full communion with the Catholic Church. In this class we review and reflect upon all that we have learned.

Easter Vigil (Saturday 4/8)Description: On the Easter Vigil, held on Holy Saturday, candidates and catechumens wishing to enter into full communion with the Catholic Church receive the three Sacraments of Initiation.

Class 26: Mystagogy (Sunday 4/16)

Instructor: Karen Tucker

Description: Mystagogy – or the "revealing of the mysteries" – is the last official act of the RCIA process. In ancient times, Mystagogy defined the final revelation of the Sacraments and their meaning. Today, Mystagogy is used to introduce new Catholics to the Catholic way of life.
